

SARAH FOSTER-SPROULL

Artistic Director Sarah Foster-Sproull, is a critically acclaimed and award-winning choreographer based in Aotearoa, New Zealand. Sarah is the first woman to be named Choreographer in Residence at the Royal New Zealand Ballet, Resident Fellow at the Centre for Ballet and the Arts at New York University '21, and a session choreographer for the New York Choreographic Institute affiliated with the New York City Ballet (2021 & 2023). In 2019 Sarah was Director of Choreography for New Zealand's largest performance event the World of Wearable Art (WOW), working with over 100 performers. Sarah was Creative New Zealand's Choreographic Fellow for 2017-2019. She is a Senior Lecturer in Dance Studies at the University of Auckland in the Dance Studies programme.

Sarah has dance work in the repertoire of The Royal New Zealand Ballet, Footnote NZ Dance, T.H.E. Dance Company (Singapore), Tamsyn Russell (Edinburgh/NZ), VOU (Fiji), The New Zealand Dance Company, and Okareka Dance Company (NZ).



Double Goer (the English translation of Doppelgänger) is a surreal and physically gruelling new dance work, that chronicles the meeting, battle, and potential demise of two strikingly similar women.

Throughout this 50-minute dance show, the women battle for supremacy through acts of competition, wit, physical agility, and stamina in a terrain of intricately hand painted artefacts. Watch as two powerhouse dancers exert their physical labour, tricks, hustle, and feminist wile in an effort to decimate each other for your entertainment.
